

A Study of Matthew

Matthew 23:1-39

Lesson 21

Assignment for next Week — Read Matthew 24:1-51 Memory Verse — Matthew 23:23

The Pharisees were very a group of people who knew the law, taught it, but did not practice it. Christ on many occasion upbraided them for this and in a discourse to the people in the 23rd chapter Christ made this very clear to the people. Much of the 23rd chapter is devoted to pointing out the hypocrisy of the Pharisees and scribes. Jesus was very upset with these people and his greatest desire was that they would come to God. Christ's great sorrow over these people is very clear in the closing words of this chapter -- "O Jerusalem, Jerusalem . . . How often would I have gathered thy children together, even as a hen gathereth her chickens under her wings, and ve would not. Behold your house is left unto you desolate."(Matthew 23:37-38) God's justice demands that he punish the wicked.

Christ had taught that our righteousness must exceed that of the Pharisees. The Pharisees in some regards were much like the fig tree Jesus had cursed in the 22nd chapter -- all show and no fruit. The Pharisees were men who knew the law and could teach it and because of this Jesus told the people to obey what they taught from the law, but not to follow their example. Today we too may be taught by people who know the will of God, but are not following it. As Christ taught the people — the same holds true for us today --- if some one teach us the will of God we should follow it and not let their example hinder us.


The Pharisees enjoyed the praise of men and

desired greetings, the best seats, and honor. Christ taught that we should not be that way. God is the only one worthy of our honor and praise. Our desires should not be to be served but to be a servant to others. The Pharisees by their traditions would break God's will. The Pharisees taught that one could swear by the temple, but not by the gold it and that they could swear by the alter, but not by the gift upon it. Christ showed the fallacy of this thinking when he taught them that the alter is greater than the gift and the temple than the gold in it.

In many other ways the Pharisees made mockery of God's will. The Pharisees were "so good" that they even tithed of mint, anise and cummin. Those spices were very small and by most standards not even worth the time to tithe: however, the Pharisees would tithe of these. Christ upbraided them because they would tithe of those spices but had forgotten the weightier matters of the law -- justice, mercy and faith. Christ did not tell them that they should not be tithing in this way, but that they should also obey the rest of the law. Christ said, "These ought ve to have done and not to have left the others undone." There is a lesson in this for us. Do we do the will of God or our own will? Do we pick what part of God's will we want to do or do we do it all? We ought to do it all and not let any part of it be undone. Our heart should be like that of Samuel, "Speak Lord, thy servant heareth." Just giving or just obeying certain commands is not enough -- God demands that we serve and obey him whole heartly.


